The event included free meal vouchers for pre-registered homeless and economically challenged families. Mililani Hongwanji obtained funding for the meal vouchers and game prizes through a Golden Chain Grant project application that was submitted by the temple via the Committee on Social Concerns. Alea Bridge (a non-profit



organization) organized the event. Alea Bridge's mission is to empower people in need to achieve self-sufficiency through genuine compassion and innovative, community-based solutions.

### LIVES REMEMBERED: A TRIBUTE TO THE FALLEN OF PEARL HARBOR

Bishop Eric Matsumoto and Reverend Toshiyuki Umitani attended a Memorial Ceremony "Lives Remembered: A Tribute to the Fallen of Pearl Harbor" which was held on Friday, December 8, 2017 at the Banyan Tree on Ford Island. This ceremony was co-hosted by the Consulate General of Japan in Honolulu and Navy Region Hawaii to recognize both the American and Japanese lives lost during the Pearl Harbor attack of 1941, and as a symbol of reconciliation and friendship between Japan and the United States. The Ceremony began with the National Anthems of both countries, remarks by Mr. Koichi Ito (The Consul General of Japan

in Honolulu) and Rear Admiral Matthew Carter (Deputy Commander, U.S. Pacific Fleet), and a keynote speaker Mr. Edwin P. Hawkins, Jr. (Executive Director, Office of Economic Development, City and County of Honolulu).
