Excerpts from Bishop's Messages of the 109th Legislative Assembly Bishop Eric Matsumoto

Aloha Kakou! Welcome to the 109th Legislative Assembly of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii! I would like extend a special warm welcome of Aloha to our guests from the Buddhist Churches of America, the Jodo Shinshu International Office and, for the first time, the Jodo Shinshu Buddhist Temples of Canada. E Komo Mai!

Let me emphasize that we are continuing to focus on the Sangha. The Sangha lives guided and inspired by the Buddha-Dharma. In Shin Buddhism, we fully acknowledge our limitations and imperfections. I am

aware that, many times, directly or indirectly and totally or partially, a cause and/or condition of others' and/or my own suffering. However, even such a limited person like myself in this imperfect world, can certainly try to live according to the ideals of Buddhism.

Just as the COVID vaccine is giving us hope in our battle with COVID-19, Amida Buddha's Light also provides us with guidance and gives us hope as it tempers our blind passions (bonno)! I firmly believe that we need more of the Buddha-Dharma to inspire and guide us as a Sangha. We have a whole host of challenges to face that has been brought on and/or aggravated by COVID-19 including our financial situation (similar to what many others in our communities are facing). Let us be guided by the Dharma or Teachings. The key to solutions for us (a Buddhist organization) is connected to the Buddha, the Dharma and the Sangha. Once again, I ask for especially the help of the ministers to share the nurturing aspect of Jodo Shinshu Teachings and the values, perspectives and behaviors that come about from encountering the Nembutsu Dharma. Gomonshu's "Our Pledge" summarizes some of the dynamics. For me, our trying to follow "Our Pledge" is not a self-power effort, but rather, our responding in gratitude to Amida Buddha and made possible by Amida Buddha. Even Rennyo Shonin attributes our being able to control our minds to Amida Buddha's Other Power. To me, from feelings and thoughts of mottainai, mooshiwakenai and arigatai that we experience, due to the Unconditional Compassion of Amida Buddha we find embracing us arises the aspiration to try to live a life that is more in accord with the Dharma (highly imperfect as it may be).

This year, I would like to direct the entire Hawaii Kyodan including all State Committees as we engage in our individual projects, endeavors and committee work to see how we can make manifest in some measurable way our Theme and Slogan "Building Healthy Sanghas: Nurturing Empathy and Respect." How can we promote and make manifest empathy and respect in our Sangha and larger community? It is

not hard to see that what our world really needs is more empathy and respect for all. Ultimately, it is Amida Buddha that is doing the nurturing, but I believe as recipients of that nurturing, we can try, imperfect as we may be, to promote empathy and respect in the world starting with our own actions.

Regardless of whether your temple is currently open or not, let us remain diligent in our efforts to contain the virus, stop the unnecessary suffering and deaths from COVID-19, help our healthcare system and professionals nearing exhaustion, better the conditions such so that our economy will be able to get back on its feet by continuing to practice safety measures for a while longer. Together with our President, I would like express my gratitude to all temples and affiliates for following the safety directives, guidelines and recommendations. Ministers and Temple Lay Leaders especially, thank you for putting so much of your time and energy into keeping our temples and members safe, secure, and still try to fulfill our purpose of sharing the Dharma including helping those who need help physically with your mask-making projects, food delivery, cooking of meals for the young and elderly, and assuring our members that they are not alone in this time of severe isolation. To all of our preschools, schools, and adult care facilities and other affiliates and programs too, thank you for doing your best to maneuver through this pandemic and still provide care and/or continue your activities. Ministers and Temple office staff, thank you for being on the forefront to continue serving our membership. Of course, I cannot leave this topic without acknowledging the tremendous effort put forth by the HQ Staff.

As we all know, COVID-19 has direly affected our Hawaii Kyodan. Most acutely, in the area of finances and our traditional in-person method of sharing the Dharma. The greatest short term hurdle our organization faces is overcoming the financial crisis brought on by the Pandemic. In these precarious times, Headquarters including the Office of the Bishop, will continue to make some decisions based on the fact that we are right now in a crisis situation and facing extraordinary circumstances. I ask for your understanding and cooperation. We must all work together, ministers and lay people, to find ways in which we can regain and even better our financial foundation so that we can continue to carry out our mission or purpose of sharing the Dharma. It can also be the other way around that the more people are touched by the Dharma the more they will support us. It behooves us to become more creative, innovative and flexible and open in this time of crisis and even beyond.

Online and social media is not perfect and has limitations, but we have entered a new age of propagation and fundraising with the internet and social media an integral part of it. It is clear that there is a significant group of people out there in the world that are hungry for the Dharma, but they do not live near a temple, are unable to come to a temple or the internet is their preferred way of receiving the Dharma. We should look into this idea of an Online Sangha. It might even be a new category of members for Hawaii Kyodan or temples.

I gratefully note that even in these difficult times, various entities of Hawaii Kyodan are continuing to work on providing meaningful resources in hopes that more people will come to know the Great Wisdom and Compassion of Amida Buddha. Please look forward for announcements for our State Ministers Association and BSC-OBE. At Headquarters, in the spirit of empathy and respect, we will continue to do our best to get us through this Pandemic. If you need assistance, please contact us.

In two years, in 2023, we will be observing the auspicious 850th Anniversary of Shinran Shonin's Birth and 800th Anniversary of the Establishment of the Jodo Shinshu Teaching. Also the next World Buddhist

Women's World Convention, will be held at the same time. We need to start planning and thus in the first half of this year I will be calling a meeting so we can start preparing for these auspicious events.

A special word of appreciation to the HQ Staff: Derrick Inouye, Rev. Takahashi and Dianne Sumida including Joy Nishida for their help with our first ever Virtual Online Regular Giseikai.

To conclude, truly, it is because of the support, dedication, commitment and generosity of all of you, Ministers and Lay Members, which makes it possible for Hawaii Kyodan to not only exist, but also share the Nembutsu Teachings and contribute to the betterment of our Hawaii. I express my deepest appreciation to one and all including our State President Dr. Warren Tamamoto. Once again, "Everyone, thank you" and "Namo Amida Butsu."

GISEIKAI MESSAGE FROM THE JODO SHINSHU HONGWANJI-HA GOVERNOR GENERAL BISHOP CHIKO IWAGAMI

On the occasion of the 109th *Giseikai* of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, which is being conducted online, I humbly extend my appreciation to you, the ministers and sangha representatives from throughout the state of Hawaii. I would also like to express my heartfelt gratitude to you all for your continuing efforts in propagating Jodo Shinshu and maintaining the temples within your respective district.

First I would like to extend my condolences to those who passed away from COVID-19, and I also would like to offer my sympathy to the people who are currently undergoing treatment for the disease.

The situation might differ depending on the area, but for almost every place in the US, gathering at the temple has been restricted and a lot of temple activities, including religious services, cannot remain intact. In the midst of such difficult times, I am truly grateful that many of you have been seeking new measures to actualize Buddhist wisdom in society. Some make the best use of the internet to share the Dharma and rejoice the Nembutsu teaching together with others. On the other hand, some feel close to and regularly contact those who are most likely to be isolated, such as, senior people who do not have access to the internet.

On the New Year's Day, Monshu Ohtani Kojun presented the following message, "Now we have to live a life with COVID-19, and it brought to our society drastic changes that caused many people unprecedented distress and suffering. Human bonds are always important, but in such severe circumstances, warm relationships between people have become vital to enabling everyone to feel at ease. I hope many are able to find peace of mind in listening to the teaching of Shinran Shonin and interacting with one another through temple activities." In accordance with his words, I raise my expectation to you to continue your insightful schemes to spread the teaching and allow the sangha to feel at home at each temple.

Here in Kyoto, we are making arrangements for the Joint Celebration of the 850th Anniversary of Shinran Shonin's Birth and the 800th Anniversary of the Establishment of the Jodo Shinshu Teaching that is scheduled for 2023. Although the pandemic has forced us to set every plan as provisional, we sincerely hope that we will be able to make this joyful occasion come true to share our appreciation for the teaching with every one of you.

In closing, it is my hope that the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii will continue to prosper and that many fruitful results will arise from this annual meeting.
